Mission Reports to the High Council October – December



Elder Cole Thomas Bagley North Carolina Charlotte Mission 4th Ward

My mission was, bar none, the greatest decision I ever made and it saved my life. I was able to come to know who Jesus Christ really is and his role in our lives. Serving in North Carolina was such a blessing because so many good Christians live there and are willing to talk openly about their faith. It didn't always mean we'd get our foot in the door, but it gave us a better chance. I love the saints out in North Carolina because they love the missionaries and become family. They truly are my brothers and sisters and I have a couple of "Mission Moms" too. It was the hardest thing I ever did, but the most rewarding and incredible experience of my life that motivates me to continue to serve the Master the rest of my life.

The most sacred moment of my mission was when I received the most undeniable witness of Jesus the Christ while teaching a Chinese woman. She was the wife of a member and had never heard of Jesus Christ so we had to start from ground zero. 


Elder Austin Thomas Lignell Guayaquil Ecuador South Mission 3th Ward
